Budget Goals

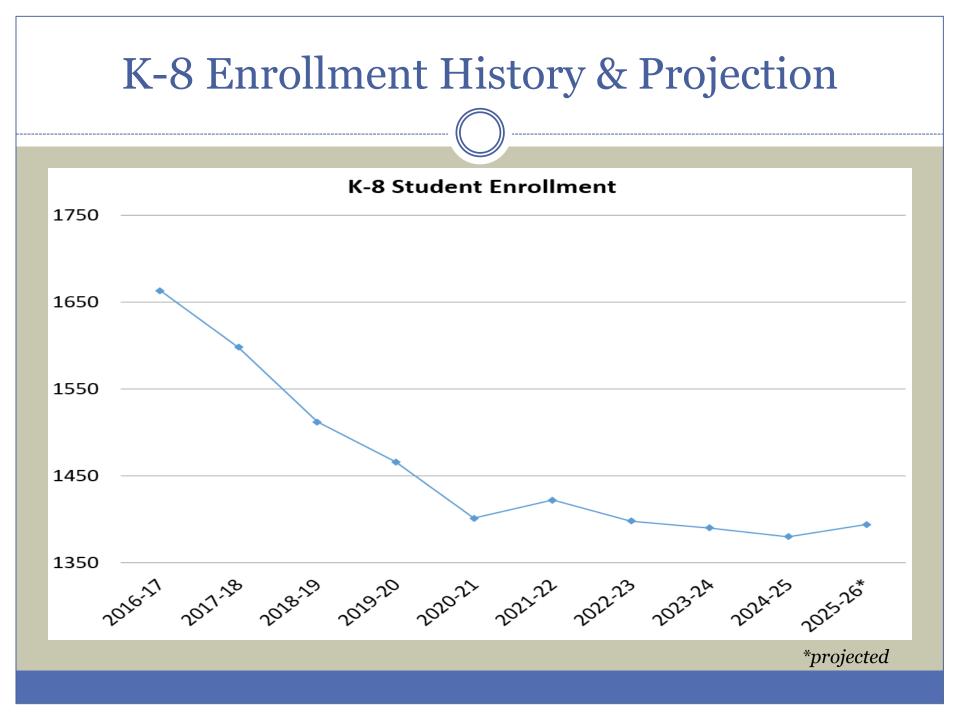
- Present a budget at the 2% state-imposed cap on tax levy with allowable adjustments without negatively impacting students' academic experiences
- Prepare for enrollment increases from new housing developments
- Balance class size guidelines with scheduling efficiencies
- Enrich students' academic experiences
- Prepare to implement a new district Strategic Plan

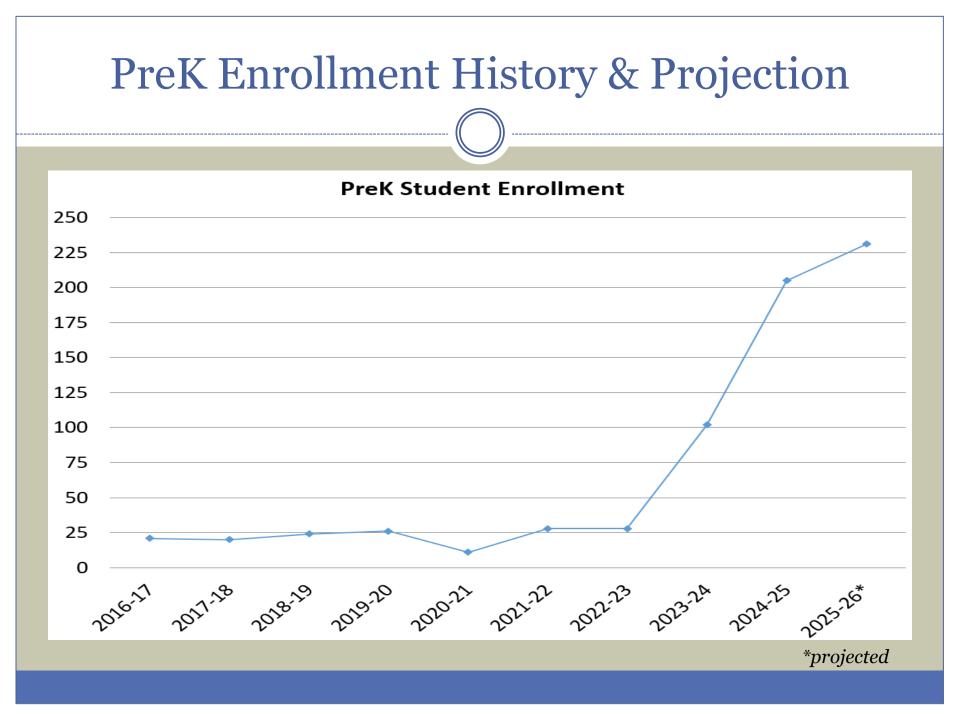
Enrollment Forecast for 2025-26

Anticipated 2025-26 K through 8 enrollment = 1366 Anticipated 2025-26 PreK enrollment = 231 Total 2025-26 enrollment = 1597 Anticipates 9 out-of-district students Presumes 149 kindergarten students in district

Current 2024-25 K through 8 enrollment = 1365 Current 2024-25 PreK enrollment = 216 Total 2024-25 enrollment = 1581 Includes 9 current out-of-district students

Enrollment figures include current students, but exclude any new students from new housing developments

Personnel Highlights

- Addition of 1 out-of-district nurse position and IEP-based bus aides
- Reconfiguration of 1 teaching staff position through attrition
- Reallocation of 2 support staff to align with programming needs
- Increased wages for police officers through shared services
- Increased wages for staff to better align with market conditions
- Increased stipend and extra-pay rates to conform with RTEA contractual obligations such as professional development, curriculum writing, before and afterschool activities, & continuation of \$1,000 stipend for paraprofessionals
- New morning bus tier dedicated to preschoolers at no cost to parents
- Continued recruitment and retention services and stipends
- Sustainment of the employee assistance program for wellness despite loss of ESSER federal funding

Preschool Expansion*

- Free curriculum-based preschool for 3- and 4-year old children residing in Readington Township
- Addition of 1 full-time preschool teacher position
- Addition of 1 full-time paraprofessional positions in-district
- Creation of 1 preschool supervisor through reallocation of existing staff positions to create dedicated oversight of student programming
- Preschool bus aides on all transportation routes
- Reallocation of shared positions for preschool community parent involvement specialist, instruction coach / intervention, referral specialist and relief teachers
- Continued preschool expansion partnership with Berry Patch, Global Pioneer / REN, Stanton Learning, & Whitehouse Prep for 15 total preschool classrooms district-wide (225 student seats)

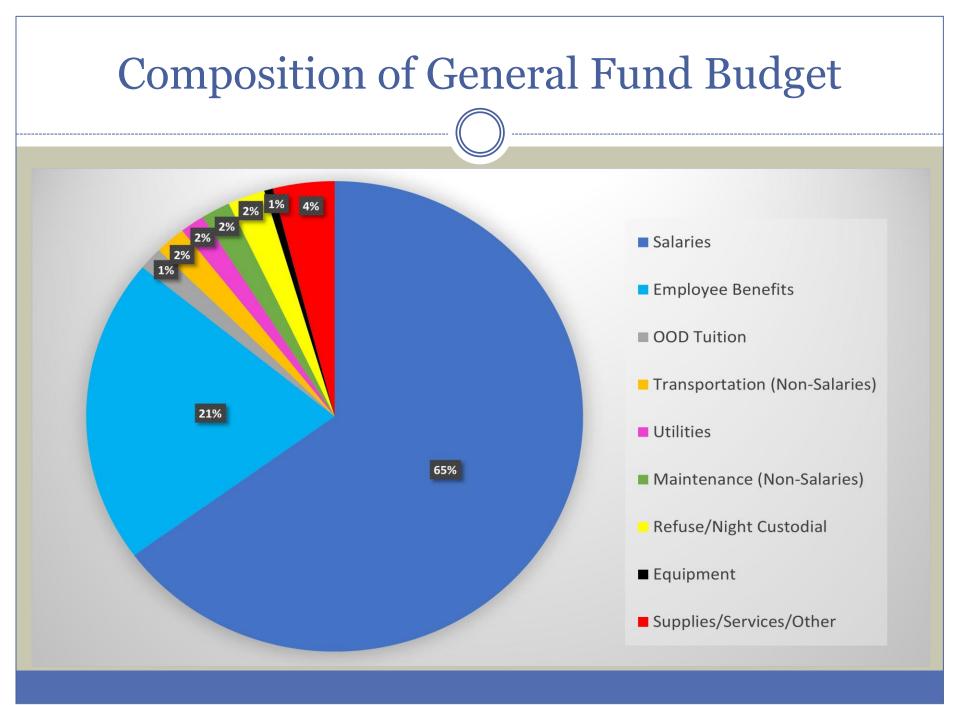
Curriculum/Pupil Services Highlights

- Continuation of self-contained special education classes & preschool disabilities program sections
 - Net savings for district compared to students being placed out-of-district
- Continuation of expanded Extended School Year programming
- Revised English language arts and math curricula to align with new state standards, purchase of new textbooks and materials for English language arts, math, science, health & handwriting
- Mental health services
 - × New school counselor suites at Readington Middle School
 - Continuation of 1 Behavioral Health Counselor & 3 Behaviorists
 - Employee Assistance Program
- English language learners support through SEI*
- Half day breakfast and lunch district-wide with low-income supports
- Development of the district's new strategic plan & implementation
- * Funded by federal grant programs, not local tax levy

Capital Projects

- <u>Referendum</u> approved by the Board of Education for a fall 2025 public vote encompassing 83 projects <u>reducing taxes compared to current levels</u>
- Removal of asbestos flooring in middle school classrooms
- Replacement of Three Bridges School water heater
- Strategic installation of water bottle filler stations district-wide
- Refinishing and enhancement of middle school performance stage floor
- New gym mats and wall padding for Holland Brook School gymnasium
- New sound system & lighting upgrades for Three Bridges School performance stage
- Refreshment of toilet room at Whitehouse School
- Enhanced drainage at Whitehouse School for safety & air quality
- New preschool classroom, bathroom, furniture & curriculum supplies*
- District-wide solar expansion with fixed utility rate for 15 years
