Budgeting Time of Year

The Board of Education is tasked with managing the budget of the district with the guidance of our Superintendent, Dr. Jonathan Hart, and district administration. As with every year, the first few months of the new year is when budgeting, planning and preparing occurs. The creation and implementation of a strong, responsible budget allows the district to maintain the many programs our students have become accustomed to. The district is also able to maintain the buildings and grounds in the manner in which our constituents have come to expect.

The 2023-2024 budget, which is currently being utilized, has helped the district to meet the goals that are set annually, and included some of the following highlights:

- Expansion to four police officers, one per building, through shared service with the Township of Readington;
- Additional elementary art teacher and grade-level teacher at Holland Brook School due to increased enrollment from new housing developments;
- New behavioral disabilities program teacher and preschool disabilities program teacher;
- Continuation of afterschool student intervention services for learning loss due to the pandemic, along with mental health services for staff and students through federal funding;
- Capital project upgrades outside the tax levy such as replacement of a roofing section and HVAC at Readington Middle School, bathroom additions at all elementary schools, LED lighting installation and outdoor gardens enhancements in line with sustainability goals, staff lounge refreshment district-wide, IT backend upgrades, along with various security and safety projects around the district.

The Board of Education shall hold open public sessions and budget topics for the upcoming 2024-2025 school year, tentatively set as follows:

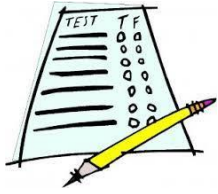
February 13, 2024: Department, personnel & benefits budget presentations

March 12, 2024: Presentation on the whole budget to the public with tentative approval

April 30, 2024: Budget hearing and final adoption of budget

During the planning of the 2024-2025 school year budget, there will be some challenges facing our district which include, as of the writing of this article, staff and program modifications due to potential increased enrollment from new housing developments, facility upgrades to ensure both students and staff remain safe and healthy, along with increases in staff salaries, inflation and health insurance premiums. In addition to these challenges, the district continues to be committed to providing our students with a comprehensive and rigorous program of studies, with a full complement of athletic and extra-curricular offerings.

All input and concerns about the budget can be heard during the February 13 board meeting as well as the other dates listed above. Public input helps the Board of Education to create a fiscally responsible budget while keeping all of the members of the community apprised of the current needs of the district. Curriculum Corner

Overcoming Academic Anxiety

Inspiring a love of learning can open up many opportunities for students, but at times, academics can lead to feelings of stress. This can create a vicious circle: If kids perform poorly, they might become anxious—and that anxiety can lead to poor performance. Here are six ways to help reduce anxiety.

1. Foster a Positive Attitude: Parents' feelings about learning can influence children's beliefs about their abilities. A growth mindset can encourage a positive attitude toward learning for everyone.
2. Make Learning Relevant: Use the 5Es (Engage, Explore, Explain, Elaborate, Evaluate) lesson model at home to engage kids in hands-on learning and real-world tasks.
3. Set High Expectations: Creating academic challenges helps students develop strong problem-solving skills, engage in productive struggle, and demonstrate grit.
4. Create a Safe Environment for Learning: Children should feel comfortable enough to take risks and share their approaches to problem-solving. They'll see mistakes as opportunities to learn and feel more comfortable persisting in the struggle.
5. Use Positive Language: Negative language can fuel self-doubt and contribute to burnout. Suggesting positive alternatives can help students change the way they think about learning. Instead of "I'm bad at this," say "I can improve." Or instead of "This is too hard for me," try "Learning takes time."
6. Write It Out: Research shows that kids who write out or discuss anxiety tend to do better on tests. This can help them reflect on their comprehension, engagement, and feelings about a lesson. Soon, they will see more choices in how they respond to challenges.

When students take control of their anxiety, they can focus more on learning and less on their worries. They can begin to see moments of struggle as areas of opportunity rather than sources of stress.

2023-2024 Preschool Program

The Readington Township Preschool Program opened its doors on January 2, 2024 and welcomed one hundred five energetic and excited 3 and 4-year old children to our preschool classrooms at Whitehouse School, Three Bridges School, Whitehouse Prep, Stanton Learning Center and Berry Patch. The preschool expansion journey began on July 3, 2023 when the department of education announced the funding opportunity for free full day preschool. We were awarded the funding in October 2023 and were able to expand the district's 1.5 part time classrooms to a total of 7 full day preschool classrooms. Our district is dedicated to fostering early childhood education in our community and we are committed to making preschool education accessible to families by offering preschool experiences in district schools and at our community learning centers.

Our inclusive classrooms support the diverse academic, social, emotional and communication needs of all students. Our classrooms are led by New Jersey Certified preschool teachers and supported by dedicated paraprofessionals.

Several of our teachers are dual certified in early childhood and special education.

The New Jersey approved preschool curriculums that are used, Tools of the Mind at Whitehouse Prep and Creative Curriculum at Berry Patch, Stanton Learning, Whitehouse School and Three Bridges, are play based, as play is the most developmentally appropriate approach to learning. Critical components of early childhood education are parent involvement, communication and collaborative home-school partnerships.

The district plans to expand our preschool program for the 2024-2025 by opening a classroom at Global Pioneer and adding additional classrooms at our learning center sites for an anticipated total of 14 classrooms. Registration for the 2024-2025 school year is scheduled for February 22nd and 23rd. Explore a World of Learning with Readington School District's Summer Spark Program! As you contemplate your summer plans, consider having your child join us for an enriching experience to engage young minds.

We're excited to announce that we have revised & enhanced our Summer Enrichment Program, "Summer Spark." We have added new workshops to our program, offering more variety each week. The program will be held the weeks of July 15 - 19 and July 22 - 25, at a district school. Families may still choose between half-day and full-day sessions to delve into workshops tailored for incoming 1st through 6th graders: Crafting Campers, Innovative Explorers, Culinary Creators, Stage Stars, and Playful Athletics.

Our workshops are thoughtfully crafted to be educational and enjoyable, emphasizing hands-on activities and group collaboration. New this year, each week will offer distinct classes, allowing students to attend both weeks without repetition. Our Culinary Creators will be cooking and baking favorite recipes, making simple desserts including creative non-baked treats. Innovative Explorers will explore with Legos, K'nex, Escape Room-style problem-solving, hands-on science experiments, and group challenges. Crafting Campers will explore various projects using different mediums, fostering creativity and personal expression.

We are offering two new programs this year: Stage Stars and Playful Athletes. Our Stage Stars

will sing Broadway songs and conclude their week with a performance for their parents and guests. Playful Athletes will explore Cross Country running and team games. Of course, no experience is necessary for any of our classes, and beginners are encouraged to attend.

Additionally, students going into new buildings this fall are invited to participate in our "Warm Welcome" orientation classes at each school: Kindergarten Kickoff (TBS/WHs), Bobcat Beginnings (HBS); and Middle School Mingle (RMS). These grade-specific classes address the unique needs of students entering a new building for the first time, providing a smoother transition for the fall when school begins.

All workshops are led by our dedicated district staff. Registration will be open in February. Secure your spot early. Class sizes are kept small to ensure individualized attention for each student, and classes sell out quickly.

Tech Department: Chromebook Care Tips

Our Technology Team understands that a reliable Chromebook is essential for our students' learning needs. To help ensure student Chromebook devices are running optimally, software and maintenance updates are automatically pushed to each of our 1500 Chromebooks on a regular basis. If a student device is experiencing any performance issues we have the ability to diagnose and troubleshoot preemptively.

Chromebooks also put on a lot of 'miles' throughout the school year. Students regularly move between the school, classrooms and home with the Chromebook close in hand. Accidents can and will certainly happen with this amount of mobility. To assist and support students in caring for their Chromebooks we have created a [Chromebook Care](#) and [Troubleshooting](#) reference.

Some of the most helpful tips are simple and very easy to follow:

- Keep the Chromebook in its protective case.
- Use two hands when moving or carrying your Chromebook.
- Keep the lid of the Chromebook closed when not in use.
