2024-2025 Budget Highlights

The Board of Education is in the process of finalizing its <u>2024-2025 budget</u>, with final adoption planned for April 30, 2024, focusing on high-quality student programming and the following goals:

- Present a fiscally responsible budget inclusive of a 2% state-imposed cap on the tax levy with allowable adjustments aligned to the district mission and vision;
- Prepare for enrollment increases from new housing developments;
- Balance class size guidelines with scheduling efficiencies;
- Enrich students' academic experiences;
- Continue to implement the district's Strategic Plan for the 2020-2025 school years.

Staff and program highlights currently planned for in the 2024-2025 budget include:

- All educational programs and class sizes are maintained in accordance with district policies;
- A continuation of 1:1 chromebook/tablet initiative for students in K through 8th grade;
- Savings through shared services and cooperative agreements with Tewksbury, Branchburg, Hunterdon County E.S.C., and the Township of Readington;
- <u>Free preschool programming</u> for 3- and 4-year old children with 14 certificated teachers and 14
 paraprofessionals along with 3 support positions in partnership with Berry Patch Learning Center,
 Global Pioneer / REN, Stanton Learning Center, and Whitehouse Preparatory School;
- Collaboration with the Township of Readington Police Department to allow for raises for 4 police officers, 1 police officer present in each of the 4 school buildings.
- Additional behavior health counselor, previously paid through a federal grant as well as reconfiguration of 2 teaching staff positions through attrition;
- Increased wages for staff to better align with market conditions, as well as new stipends and stronger extra-pay rates;
- New schedule at the middle school and revised schedules at the elementary schools to provide more direct instruction time for students, in addition to revised English language arts and math curricula and resources;
- Low-income supports for half day breakfast and lunch district-wide through federal funding;
- English language learners supports via Structured English Immersion and federal funding; and
- Continued implementation of the district's Strategic Plan work.

Further, the district plans for the following capital projects having no impact on next year's tax levy funded through district reserves as a result of prudent spending:

- Creation of new Readington Middle School main office with enhanced counselor and nurse suites, inclusive of asbestos removal, a new roof and HVAC replacement;
- Refreshed preschool classrooms, bathrooms and curriculum supplies;
- New art and computer room at Whitehouse School;
- District-wide solar expansion to meet 85% or more of all electric needs and LED classroom lighting upgrades at Readington Middle School;
- District-wide security upgrades in partnership with the Township of Readington/Police Department;
- Backend IT upgrades such as core switches and access points, among others;
- Playground enhancements at Whitehouse and Three Bridges Schools; and
- Softball and baseball field updates, fencing and district-wide signage.

NJSLA Comparison Testing

The Readington Township School District has reported impressive scores in both English Language Arts (ELA) and Math. In ELA 3rd through 8th grade, 72% of students have met or exceeded expectations, while in Math 3rd through 8th grade, 58% of students have met or exceeded expectations. These scores are notably higher than the state averages in both subjects.

When compared to districts of similar economic status as determined by the free and reduced lunch population, Readington has outperformed communities across the state. Readington has also outperformed the other school districts located in Hunterdon County. Furthermore, Readington continues to perform well in comparison to our District Factor Group (DFG). DFGs were developed in 1975 to compare student performance on statewide assessments

across demographically similar school districts. In ELA, Readington has surpassed the DFG, while in Math, the scores were in line with the DFG.

The impressive academic results achieved by Readington are not a one-time occurrence. Data reveals that the district has maintained consistently high levels of academic achievement since the 2016-2017 academic year, and its students continue to perform exceptionally well. New Jersey has historically been regarded as one of the top-performing states in the country, but the results show that Hunterdon County is currently outperforming the state, with Readington students leading the way. All of this success is a testament to the hard work and dedication of the school district's teachers and students.

2024-2025 Preschool The Readington Preschool Program is Growing

The Readington Preschool Program is growing for the 2024-2025 school year! We are pleased to share that we received over 3 million dollars in funding from the state to expand our free preschool program. Next year we are excited to with Global Pioneer partner Learning Center where we will have two preschool classrooms. Additionally, we will be adding two additional classrooms at Whitehouse Prep, two classrooms at Berry Patch, and one more classroom at Stanton Learning Center bringing the total number of preschool classrooms to 14!

On February 22nd and 23rd, the district held in person preschool registration for the 2024-2025 school year. One hundred and forty-seven children registered for preschool. Families will

be notified by April 1, 2024 regarding acceptance status and preschool site placement. Children may still be registered for preschool by contacting Mrs. Gerry Glackin at 908-534-2195 ext. 2955. Children must be three years old by October 1st.

Our children who are continuing for a second year of preschool will also receive a confirmation letter in the spring. Children will require an updated physical for the 2024-2025 school year.

March 8, 2024 was SEL (Social and Emotional Learning) Day. Last year, the U.S. Senate introduced a resolution designating March 6-10, as "National SEL Week" to recognize the critical role SEL plays in supporting the academic success and overall well-being of students, educators, and families. The resolution was introduced by Senator Susan Collins (R-Maine) and Senator Dick Durbin (D-Illinois). This bipartisan resolution came at a crucial time following the COVID-19 pandemic, when heightened needs around students' academic recovery and social-emotional development and mental health came into focus around the country.

Readington Township Public Schools have been invested in our students' development of social and emotional competence for several years. This work and dedication are difficult to sum up into one day because SEL is an integral part of

the fabric of Readington's educational system. The process of learning is both social and emotional and this is reflective in our shared values and district mission, which states, "We empower members of our community to lead purposeful lives with integrity, to cultivate a spirit of discovery, and to embrace connections in our diverse, global society." It has certainly been a busy and rewarding winter at WHS! We are thrilled to have the opportunity to share some of our recent activities and initiatives with you.

DEAR (Drop Everything And Read) Time - We also celebrated *WHS Favorite Book Day* & saluted *Dr. Seuss* by lining the hallways and stopping to read as a school community.

1000-Minute Reading Challenge - Each winter, our librarian, Mrs. Valerie Zanardi, facilitates a school-wide reading challenge for one month and she tracks the progress of all classes based on the number of minutes read. As you can see, some bar graphs have climbed up the wall and even reached the ceiling! Individual students are also recognized and we have had several 3,000-minute readers this year!







WHS Annual Thematic Unit - Each year, WHS engages in a different thematic unit as a whole school. This year, it is *Mary Poppins*. We have been embracing all of the ways that we can connect it to other areas of learning for our students. Teachers integrated topics from the storyline into writing assignments that are aligned with our grade level programs. In mathematics, they "capitalized" on the fact that Mr. Banks was a banker, so parlayed that into a study of money concepts. Students also completed related assignments in specials classes such as kite-themed artwork, umbrella projects, Google comic animation, and *supercalifragilisticexpialidocious* word play. As a school, we had a "Story Synthesis Day" on March 1, when our kindergartners and first graders had an opportunity to partner with upperclassmen. The youngsters used 2-circle Venn diagrams (hula hoops) to share the comparisons they made of the two different *Mary Poppins* picture books that they had read. Later, second and third graders synthesized the information from those picture books, as well as the *Mary Poppins* novel, using a 3-circle Venn diagram.

Additionally, we used the *Engineering Design Process* under the direction of our Enrichment Teacher, Mrs. Leslie Martinez, as we celebrated NJ Makers Day on March 14 while also aligning it with our theme. Each child created a One-Man-Band like Bert does in the *Mary Poppins* movie. Afterward, classes held jam sessions with their instruments as each homeroom group sang and recorded the Whitehouse School cheer.







On March 22, we will host the WHS *Nanny Poppins* musical. The performance is sure to be an artistic smash, thanks to Dr. Emily Bengels and Mr. Chad Schubert, along with more than 40 little actors from our Grade 3 Drama & Storytelling Clubs! In 2023 our district was awarded a cyber security grant through the New Jersey Cybersecurity and Communications Integration Cell (NJCCIC), a component of the New Jersey Office of Homeland Security and Preparedness. The State and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program (SLCGP) grant is a federal grant program administered by the United States Department of Homeland Security.

This cyber security award enabled our district to implement network security software and monitoring tools to help protect our district from cyber security threats. Utilizing these tools and services, this security platform is monitored by a dedicated remote security team to assist our district in the event of detection of suspicious activity or breach. Additionally, network security training and certification is offered to the districts awarded this grant. District staff can also participate in various cyber security training programs providing further security resources. We are very grateful to NJCCIC for awarding and assistance in implementing this security platform. We look forward to a continued partnership with NJCCIC along with our other network security partners.
