Message from the Superintendent

June 2024

Dear Readington Community,

As the school year comes to a close, I take this opportunity to look back on all that has been accomplished since September. Overall, I have found the 2023-2024 school year to be one that propelled the Readington Township Schools forward.

Our district moved several important goals forward over the course of the year. First, we remained focused and committed to our strategic work in promoting inquiry, partnerships and social awareness. To that end, the RMS therapy dog program excelled, student passion projects were investigated, teachers continued inquiry projects and are looking to share their scholarly work beyond Readington. Partnerships were strengthened in 8th grade where Civics projects involved more community stakeholders and students went out into the community to engage in service learning. Our strategic mission remains a focus as we move into next year.

The success of the preschool program is immeasurable. The district opened classrooms at TBS, WHS and three private providers to offer free, universal preschool to approximately 105 3- and 4- year olds. This was all done in less than 4 months. Further, the district will expand preschool to over 200 seats for next school year! The positive impact universal early childhood education will have on our community will remain for years to come.

Academic achievement improved as we moved into this year. The NJSLA scores demonstrate that the district students are achieving virtually to pre-pandemic levels. iReady diagnostic data shows substantial growth made by students as we finish the 2023-2024 school year. I am so proud of our student's hard work and dedication to learning!

Readington Middle School Renovation Project

Readington Middle School is embarking on a dramatic change for the upcoming school year with the complete renovation of the middle school main office, school counselors and nurse suites. The project budget is comprised of \$2.8 million and shall commence this summer extending to winter break.

The project entails a complete redesign spearheaded by staff desires and future needs including:

- Removal of asbestos for better air quality and health of staff and students;
- Modernized counselor and mental health offices to aid in student well-being;
- Enhanced privacy and safety layout of the nurse suite for health in a post-pandemic world;
- Security vestibule augmentations for stronger safety protocols and measures, including a collaborative police officer designated workspace near the visitor entrance;
- Removal of wall and window air conditioners for installation of efficient heat-pump HVAC systems in-line with sustainability efforts;
- Replacement of out-of-warranty roof aged over 25-years with a new, multi-layered roofing system with enhanced drainage;
- Larger and more dynamic conference room spaces for team and parent meetings;
- Renovation of bathrooms, increase in storage, and skylights for natural light infusion;
- Brand new furniture and counseling elements; and a
- New lounge space for staff well-being, among other aspects.

Unfortunately, due to the large scope of the project, construction shall extend into the fall of 2024 and continue while staff and students are inside the building. For utmost security and safety, the entire main office shall be sealed from the rest of the building and a construction, privacy fence shall be installed for workers to enter and exit the main office through an exterior wall. All major demolition and use of major equipment shall occur in the summer, with the roof and nurse offices anticipated to be complete before the start of the school year. Primarily aesthetic work in the main office will be left for September through December while the building is occupied. Workers shall have supplies within the fence to avoid any interaction with students and personnel during the school day, and a freeze of worker movement entering and exiting the site shall occur at arrival and dismissal. All other aspects of the building will remain intact, with parent drop-off and pick-up

still occurring at the front entrance and full functionality of the vestibule, where visitors shall enter and/or parents can drop off student materials if forgotten.

The district is thrilled to able to transform the Readington Middle School main office without any additional costs to taxpayers as district reserves shall be utilized to fund the project outside of the tax levy through efficient budget and fiscal restraints spearheaded by the Board of Education. More design elements and visual aspects are anticipated to be shared as the project unfolds. The district thanks you in advance for your patience as construction is undertaken, and is looking forward to showing the amazing results upon completion with the community. Make Summer Learning a Family Affair

Set Expectations

Tell your child that reading and learning activities will be an important part of their summer, but make sure they know they'll still have lots of time for play.

Create Mini Lessons

Everyday activities make great learning opportunities. Have kids count change, write a shopping list, or calculate a recipe's measurements.

Encourage Creative Writing

Have your child keep a summer journal, write letters to family members or friends, or start a family cookbook with your favorite recipes, instructions, and shopping lists.

Read Daily

Set aside at least 15 minutes a day for your entire family to read. (That means parents, too!) Organize a summer read-a-thon with goals for each family member, or sign your child up for your library's summer book club.

Let Them Play

Schools often use playful learning in the classroom. To boost playful learning at home, encourage kids to play matching or guessing games or solve puzzles. Go for a walk and have them look for shapes in the neighborhood buildings or playground equipment or hunt for letters or words around town. Setting up a restaurant or a shop is full of learning opportunities for kids, too.

Travel Around the Globe—Virtually

Have an international evening where you cook a meal with recipes from a different country. Learn basic words in that country's language. Find the country on a map, and read a book or an article about what life is like there.

Learn During Family Trips

On vacation, stop at zoos, children's museums, or historic sites. Have your child help you plot out the trip using maps and keep a journal along the way. Older kids can tally up miles, keep track of expenses, or compute gas mileage.

Promoting a child's love of learning is one of the most important things we can do as parents to put our children on the road to success. Keep the learning alive this summer and reap the benefits in the fall when your child goes back to school with confidence.

Building Spotlight: Three Bridges School

With the piloting of the Heinemann Flights program in kindergarten and first grade at TBS this year, we've witnessed remarkable growth and enthusiasm among our students and teachers. The journey through phonics and literacy has been truly inspiring.

Building Foundations with Phonics

At the heart of our success lies the solid foundation of phonics. Phonics is the key that unlocks the world of reading and writing for our young learners. Through Heinemann Flights, our students have been immersed in systematic phonics instruction, enabling them to decode words with confidence and accuracy.

Next Steps in Phonics

As we look ahead to the next school year, we're excited to share what's in store for your child's phonics development:

- **Kindergarten:** Your child will embark on the journey of the alphabetic principle. They will begin by learning to recognize and name each letter of the alphabet, followed by understanding the primary sounds associated with each letter. Activities like rhyming games and multisensory learning further enhanced their phonemic awareness, setting the stage for reading success.
- **Grade 1:** Building upon their foundational knowledge, students will dive into more complex phonics skills. From blending and segmenting sounds to recognizing word families and patterns, they'll expand their reading repertoire with confidence.
- **Grade 2:** In the second grade, students will master advanced phonics concepts such as diphthongs, digraphs, and long vowel sounds. Fluency practice and word analysis will further solidify their reading skills, empowering them to tackle more challenging texts with ease.

Sound Walls

We have also seen children empowered in their reading and writing through the use of Sound Walls. In addition to systematic phonics instruction, our teachers are implementing Sound Walls in the classroom. Sound Walls are visual displays that organize and categorize the different sounds in our language, helping students recognize patterns and make connections between letters and sounds. By referring to the Sound Wall, children can tackle hard words more confidently, as they have a visual reference for decoding unfamiliar sounds and spelling patterns.

Supporting Your Child's Literacy Journey at Home

We are making great progress in school. If you would like to assist in your child's literacy development here are some tips to support your child's phonics and reading comprehension at home:

- **Phonics Development:** Start early and practice regularly with fun, multisensory activities like alphabet games and letter tracing. Celebrate your child's progress and provide positive reinforcement along the way.
- **Reading Comprehension:** Encourage your child to ask questions, discuss the text, and make connections to their own experiences. Foster visualization and expand their vocabulary by exploring new words together.

• Foster a Love of Reading: Make reading a cherished part of your daily routine by incorporating it into family time. Visit the library together, model reading behavior, and let your child see the joy of getting lost in a good book.
